Same Topic, Different Doors: Unlocking Learning with Text Sets

Presented by Kristine Kelly, ATLAS and Elizabeth Bennett, Literacy MN

In this interactive workshop, you'll learn how to create and use differentiated text sets

to engage learners at multiple levels. We'll explore what text sets are, their classroom benefits, practical ways to use them, and their connection to the CCRS. We'll also review the steps for measuring text to ensure appropriate levels and complexity, and gain hands-on experience using generative AI to adapt and create texts, as well as generate questions. By the end, you'll leave with ready-to-use texts and ideas you can apply immediately in your multilevel classroom.

(a) Teaching with Compassion: Understanding Addiction and Supporting Adult Learners

Presenter: Amanda Longie, Bemidji State University

Adult education classrooms often include learners who are directly or indirectly affected by substance use. Addiction can shape how students think, feel, and learn, which sometimes shows up in the classroom as fatigue, mood changes, or inconsistent attendance. This interactive workshop will explore how addiction impacts the brain and learning, what substance use may look like in daily life, and how teachers and administrators can respond with compassion while maintaining clear boundaries. Participants will learn strategies to handle behaviors related to substance use, review organizational policies that support safety, and explore resources available in Northern Minnesota. Practical tools, classroom suggestions, and real-world examples will be shared to help educators recognize potential signs of addiction and respond in ways that balance student support with staff well-being. *Location: Sunken Island Room*

(b) Connecting the Dots: Building Career Pathways Together

Presenters: Carly Voshell and Patsy Egan, ATLAS

Career Pathways connect education, training, and career opportunities to open doors for adult learners. What's already working in northern MN—and where can we grow stronger? This interactive session invites educators, administrators, and partners of all experience levels to dig into this essential part of adult education: supporting learners on the path to family-sustaining careers. Together, we'll connect the dots between instruction, workforce needs, and student goals to strengthen Career Pathways. Join state leaders to explore strategies for contextualized instruction (a cornerstone of effective Career Pathways!), clarify roles and partnerships in Minnesota's ACP work, share key resources and build networks that support Career Pathways programs. In addition to a speaker from Apprenticeship Minnesota, program sponsors located in northern MN will explain how their programs operate and what they look for in applicants. By the end of this workshop, educators will know what a registered apprenticeship program is, what students they should recommend them to, and how to give students the information they need to search for a program in their area.

How can adult English learners build digital skills while also learning English? In this session, Cara Berger, a teacher and supervisor at Neighborhood House, will share their experience participating in Literacy Minnesota's Best Practices in Digital Education Cohort, and the ways in which they've incorporated digital literacy in both online and in-person classrooms. Cara will share resources and routines that can be used with beginning, intermediate and advanced ESL learners, talk about troubleshooting challenges, and explore how digital platforms can support multilevel classrooms and create continuity between in-person and online classrooms. Hamline University Land Acknowledgement

Provided by the Hamline Vice President for Inclusive Excellence, Dr. David Everett

Hamline acknowledges that the land on which we gather and refer to as Minnesota is the traditional and unceded territory of the Dakota and Ojibwe. Minnesota comes from the Dakota name for this region, Mni Sota Makoce, "the land where the waters reflect the skies." We pay respect to the members of not only those tribes, but others as well, both past and present, and their continuing relationship to their ancestral lands. Making this recognition expresses gratitude and appreciation to those whose territory we reside on and honors the Indigenous people who have been existing with, and on, the land from time immemorial. This long-standing history is significant as land acknowledgements do not exist in a past tense or historical context—colonialism, appropriation, and genocide have relevant, real-time realities. We need to build mindfulness regarding the source of our present land privilege, understand the long-standing history from which it comes, and seek to reconcile our place within both.

Hamline, as an institution and community, will hold itself accountable as an Indigenous partner by working stridently to amplify, address, and counter the historical and contemporary injustices that continue to impact Indigenous people—individually, systemically, and structurally.
